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Kapolei Regional Park Gets Major Security Upgrade

Thanks to public/private partnership



he 73-acre Kapolei Regional Park is clearly the centerpiece of Kapolei's public parks system, as shown by its popularity and heavy use by area residents. The park, which was dedicated to the City and County's Parks and Recreation Department by the Estate of James Campbell in 1994, is a hub for outdoor activities in the region. Thousands of residents use the expansive grounds for all sorts of activities like family picnics, kids and schools sporting events, hula halau practice sessions, company team building activities, and the list goes on.

An island-wide concern has been the need for security measures at park restroom facilities to reduce off-hours vandalism and keep the restrooms in good working order for park users. Community concern and support led to the passage of Bill 78 by the Honolulu City Council in April 2017. The bill was authored and shepherded through the Council by Councilmember Kymberly Marcos Pine. The purpose of the bill was to set up a public/ private initiative that would improve the conditions of city parks and facilities without increasing costs to the taxpayer. The bill establishes a process for residents, groups and businesses to help take care of their community parks. In exchange, they receive modest sponsorship recognition for their support.

Kapolei has already taken advantage of Bill 78. It started at Kapolei Regional Park where the City's Department and Recreation installed gates to secure the bathroom facilities when the park closes at 10 p.m. The City of Kapolei Association stepped in to help defray the security costs by paying for private security to close the facility at the end of the day. City workers re-open the bathrooms in the morning.

"The City of Kapolei Association is happy to do its part to help provide added security at our park," said Association president, Corinne Hiromoto. "We want to thank the City's Parks and Recreation Department and Councilmember Kymberly Pine for spearheading this effort.

The City of Kapolei Association's support for the park's overall condition also includes landscape and hardscape maintenance, removing abandoned carts, and monitoring the homeless situation in cooperation with the Honolulu Police Department (HPD).

Another level of security is now in the works, with local business owner Todd Bedford's offer to Councilmember Pine to donate security cameras through his company, Lifeline Fire & Security. This will be a joint effort with HPD to help deter crime and secure park facilities.


